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

## Islamic Environmentalism: The Means and the End

As any seasoned activist will know, the goal or end, may not only take considerable time, but may in fact not be reached within a lifetime. Nonetheless, any effort to get there will always leave us with the "means" we have chosen to achieve our objective. Gandhi, perhaps, takes this even further when he says, "As the means, so the end."

Hoping that these ideals were not out of reach, I set myself the task of starting a group called LINE (London Islamic Network for the Environment) just over three years ago.

#### Social ecology

LINE campaigns for environmental justice, and in the process it also attempts to nurture social cohesion. This integrated approach, I hope, is providing a small but significant antidote to the wider tension and misunderstandings felt by certain communities. One forum within which such nurturing takes place is LINE's monthly meetings in central

London which attract a diverse, albeit small group of people.

Muslims, usually a Buddhist and Christian or two, as well as anarchists and those of no formal faith sit on chairs to form a circle and hear a small chapter from the Qur' an before taking a few minutes silence together. I have found that along with good facilitation, this ritual, which marks both the beginning and end of each LINE meeting, provides a taste of stillness and hence a basis for more reflective dialogue. The means by which we discuss how we can care for the natural world can also result in us better understanding one another.

Guest speakers at these meetings have included Ewa Jasiewicz who spoke on "Oil control in Iraq", Derek Wall on "Green economics" and Usama Hasan on "Ramadan and consumerism". Most recently we heard a talk on "Non-violence in Islam" from Abu Muntasir, of JIMAS.

#### Action in flippers

LINE has also organised numerous events in the wider community which have been both creative and educational. Most evecatching was our stunt in Brick Lane, a highly Bangladeshi area of London. Here, several of us donned a pair of snorkels and flippers to highlight that sealevel rise from climate change would hit Bangladesh particularly hard. One of my aims as the coordinator of this stunt was to also draw in participation from Muslim hijab-wearing women. With a snorkel worn on top of their garment, the social tension around it might also lighten somewhat through the comical nature of the stunt. My persuasive powers drew in two such women, and the Guardian also covered the story and threw in a small photo.

#### Fun and funding

Like many groups, we find that it's a tough world when we need money and when we simultaneously want to ensure we keep to our principles in the long run. So far LINE has gotten by (just about!) on small donations from individuals, and despite the temptations which will keep coming our way, this kind of financial basis is one that I hope we will remain strong enough to keep. Deep dialogue, comical eco-stunts and thinking about who funds us... if that's part of Islamic environmentalism, then keep me in!

## Climate Change: Journey of a Muslim

On Sunday 13th May 2007, I left home for the 'Campaign Against Climate Change' conference at LSE (London School of Economics) feeling excited, but also very unprepared. I felt I didn't know enough about climate change or Islam to be facilitating a small group discussion at the LINE workshop, titled 'Climate Change & Muslims: Developing a Grassroots Movement'.

#### Discovery through questioning

I calmed myself by remembering tion that this event was more about discovering ideas for practical actions, and less about discussing theories and facts on cli-

mate change. It would begin with four speakers stimulating us with a five-minute talk each, and then the participants – LINE regulars and anyone else who chose to attend this particular workshop – would speak in their small groups, focussing on answering specific, connected questions.

These four questions were:

- 1. What is the Muslim Community doing on Climate Change?
- 2. What does the Muslim Community need to be doing (if anything)?
- 3. What obstacles are in the way (if any)? &
- 4. What can we (in the room) do now to help overcome these obstacles?

Each person was allocated a one-minute slot to concisely express their answer to each question. Groups then took turns to feedback to the main assembly.

#### Time to go round

Half my group was Muslim, and half non-Muslim. Whilst we did not know each other, everyone responded enthusiastically and one person volunteered to take notes. As we went round, everyone was able to talk about what Muslims *are* doing on cli-

mate change, though it also became clear that each person had their own unique perspective, having engaged with Muslims from different communities.

Most challenging, however, was making suggestions for what Muslims *need* to be doing, and *strategies* for overcoming obstacles in the way of this. Here, our one-minute limit helped us to stay focussed on strategies, rather than go into issues, and it also encouraged us to stay positive. For example, we often accompanied sugges-

tions with, "I don't know if that would work", but we did not waste time elaborating on what, or why, we on didn't know; rather these recognitions of uncertainty provided

us with encouragement to try out

embryonic ideas.

#### Road to empowerment

By the end of the workshop, the obstacle that resonated most for me was that whilst many Muslims are taught Arabic pronunciation of the Our'an, they do not know its many references to the environment. Consequently, I became determined to start learning English translations of these verses, so I could pass on this knowledge to others. Fortunately, since then, in reading Muzammal Hussain's paper, "Islam and Climate Change: Perspectives & Engagement", I have discovered not only many citations, but also compelling reasoning from an Islamic perspective for action on climate change. A few months later, and I now feel confident enough to devise and deliver LINE workshops on the environment to community groups.

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## To The Mosque, But How?

"In the name of God, the most beneficent, the most merciful"

How can the *Hadith* (sayings & traditions) of the Prophet Muhammad (Peace be Upon Him) empower us to tackle climate change?

Islam is a complete way of life that offers guidance to humankind through the *Qur'an* and the *Hadith*. In addition to the many *ayahs* (verses) from the glorious *Qur'an*, there are many *Hadith* that refer directly

to our duty to be *khalifah* (viceroys) of the earth God has blessed us with, and respect the *mizan* (balance) that He has established in the environment. By drawing upon this guidance, Moslems could, through their example, take a lead in combating climate change, and in doing so strengthen their *taqwa* (piety).

#### What the Prophet said

In an authentic *Hadith* translated from Sahih Moslem by Dr. A. H. Halimah in his book *The Wisdom of the Prophet Muhammad* (PBUH), Abu Hurairah reported that the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) said:

"Every step made by a person who performs their ablution and walks to the mosque to perform their prayers will wipe out a sin of theirs and raise them a degree on the scale of good deeds."

#### Reality of experience

Regrettably, from my own experience as a Moslem when going to the mosque to pray, especially on Fridays and during the holy month of Ramadan, there is the predicted confusion, congestion and traffic jams caused by worshippers battling to park their cars as near to the mosque as possible.

When the prayers have concluded,
this is followed by complaints

from the mosque's
neighbours about blocked
driveways, and confrontations
with traffic wardens who are
simply doing their job.

#### Health, environment & beauty

Let's heed the advice left to us by the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) who encouraged us to walk\*. This would not only solve the problems caused by our reliance on the car, but would also improve our health and reduce the harmful CO2 emissions that cars release into the environment. If the distance between our home and destination is too great, then we could try taking public transport for part of the journey and walk for the remaining part. At the same time, walking would give us the opportunity, time, and space to admire and appreciate God's beautiful creation around us.

\* For some people, such as those with certain disabilities, walking may not be possible. This statement is thus not meant to be inclusive of this, as well as other groups, who may have a genuine obstacle preventing them from walking, either temporarily or permanently.
